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Pastor's Reflection

Dehumanization and the Great Divide

A big thank you to everyone who has welcomed me into this community over the last month. I have enjoyed learning about UCCB; having people stop into my office; and going out to joyful visits during the week. As I settle into the routines, traditions, and relationships of our community, I want the fun and celebration of our new covenant to keep on rolling. I hope we can find different ways and times to get to know each other and begin our work together.

Through this wonderful time of new beginnings, I am also mindful of the fears and concerns in our community caused by the division and harshness we see in the world today. What can we do? Where is God in all of this?

A few years ago, I was called to the psychiatric unit of a local hospital. I was asked to check in with a young person recently admitted for observation who identified as transgender. They asked to go to the hospital because they felt unsafe and afraid. There had been a loud public decree against transgender people. This rhetoric had turned this young person's life upside down. I sat with them for just a short time. They shared their story and some of their favorite Bible scriptures. They shared with me how much their faith provided them with resilience and peace. They knew God was walking with them. I sat humbly listening. I was learning so much from this amazing person. And I thought to myself, I never want my need for security and comfort to be the reason someone else has their life and security turned upside down.

This is what causes me so much pain in our society today. Our country is so very divided. Somehow, we have arrived at a place in our history when half of our country is afraid of specific things and the other half of the country is afraid of the exact opposite things. It is like the great divide that we each stand on one side, unable to reach over to each other. How did we arrive here?

Our two-party political system certainly likes it when the political climate is so binary. It certainly makes political campaigns easier when there are only two answers to every question grouped into two opposite groups of constituents. I also believe the isolating nature of our communities today causes us not live, work, or talk with each other on a regular basis. We don't know each other and that makes it easier to dehumanize each other.

In our scripture from this past Sunday, March 23rd, Jesus warned his followers not to dehumanize others. He told them to stop thinking others were more sinful and to begin to mend their own soil. He called them to work together to produce fruit, because we all have just this one precious life to live. We are not here to separate and judge. We are here to mend the soil so that we all can live and thrive in this world and bring God's justice, love, and peace to all.

And so, as I look around our communities today, I am sad. We are seeing so many lives turned upside down. We are seeing so many of us unable to speak to each other about our concerns. We are seeing more and more dehumanization of others that ensures that the great divide will continue to grow. Dehumanization allows horrible atrocity to occur. It allows us to hurt each other without feeling empathy or even guilt. Dehumanization allows us to take the honor and respect of life away from another human being with righteousness and no accountability for the pain afflicted.

What is the answer to dehumanization? I believe the answer is community and love. Our world needs more of us to dedicate ourselves to sitting together and listening. Our world needs us to see each other,

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truly see each other. And that type of relationship takes time, time together. That is why I have so much hope for church in our world. The church is a unique institution in our community that can bring people together in meaningful ways. At UCCB, we are dedicated to Welcoming All; Caring for the World; and Growing in Spirit. That calling is an invitation for people from across generations, socio-economic classes, ethnic and racial backgrounds, gender and sexual identities, and simply different life experiences to come together.

Church is a place where all of us can worship together, work together, and get to know each other at a deeper level. Get to know each other in a way that allows us to talk about our world and our lives. Imagine that! That is where the divide could begin

to be narrowed. That is where we can commit to not dismissing each other's humanity. That is a special place. As church we are called to always stand with those who are being harmed. And we are called to see God in each and every person we meet. I am excited to work together to create a space in this world that can be a place of healing and bringing people together, so that we are all always recognized for our humanity, God's gift to this world.



Maine Seacoast Mission was started in 1905 by two brothers, both pastors, who realized that the spiritual needs of the island residents of far Downeast Maine were not being met. Today Maine Seacoast Mission's focus includes rural education and healthcare issues. While they provide a wide array of support services, they only utilize mission trip volunteers in their Housing Rehabilitation Program. Downeast Maine has an old and decaying housing stock and the need for repairs and weatherization on these homes is constant. With the support of volunteers, Maine Seacoast Mission is able to help their most vulnerable neighbors.
